

# **Autumn Message**

There are many old sayings about change, but really it's never easy. Life throws up all sorts of events and situations that force us to make some difficult decisions. How must it have been for the settlers who sailed across the oceans to build new lives in New Zealand, carving out farms and settlements in the bush. So far from all that was known and familiar. It took a leap of faith, coupled with some determination, a lot of hard work and, in different parts of the country, the help of the local Maori pa.

The earthquakes which made St James' church tower unsafe are the sort of thing that can't be planned for, but have to be lived through with God-given strength and hope. It was a difficult decision, after much sincere prayer and thought, to decommission the church and wind up the formal parish structure. But St James' as a faith community continues, woven through the life of Woodville.

Our love, prayers and support go out to the St James' folk, who are always most welcome at Holy Trinity. Our two parishes have had a close relationship the decades. Holy Trinity will be home to a number of memorials and items from St James, testament to the relationship and St James' place here in Woodville.

In speaking of testaments, the Day of Pentecost (this year falling on Sunday 20 May) reminds us of the birth of the church as a body going out into the world. As the Spirit moved through the first disciples, causing them to speak in the languages of all the countries of the Mediterranean world, that same Spirit moves through people today. It inspires us to step out in new directions together, attentive to new ways of being God's hands, mouths and hearts out in the world.

Life is filled with change, but we endure and flourish, as communities have throughout the ages. May the warming Pentecost fire of God's love warm you this winter and always.

# Woodville Food Bank



Holy Trinity held its Annual General Meeting after the service on Sunday 11 March. The financial and ministry reports were presented. Judy Harding, Rosie McMillan, Vicky McMillan, Nell Mountfort, Ian Riley, Sandra Riley, Rona Squires, James Uren and Janice Wiri were elected Vestry members. Janice was confirmed as Bishop's Warden and Rona as People's Warden.

After 30 years of service, Judy stepped down as Parish Treasurer. Janice spoke on behalf of Vestry to acknowledge all that Judy has done in that time and presented her with flowers and a small token of thanks. Janice was then unanimously elected Treasurer and stood down as Vestry Chair. Vicky was subsequently elected Chair.

# **Anglican Missions Board Lenten Appeal**

The bring and buy table that was at the back of Holy Trinity during lent, raised just under \$200 for the Anglican Missions Board's 2018 Lenten Appeal, which Vestry topped up to \$250. This year's Appeal was raising money for three projects helping children in poor communities:

- 1. teaching materials for the Saviour Evangelical School in Zarka, northeast Jordan, which educates over 300 children from many of the poor and marginalized communities of the region;
- 2. a reliable van for the Rwenzori Special Needs Foundation in Uganda, which serves children with disabilities in the very poor Fort Portal region of the country the van will transport children and their families from outlying homes to hospital and rehabilitation facilities; and
- 3. equipment to produce braille and raised-letter materials at the Arab Episcopal School in Irbid, northern Jordan, which specialises in educating blind and visually-impaired children from across the region who don't have any options at local schools.

The money we raised will help transform the lives of many children; a big thank you to everyone who donated items for sale and those who bought them.

# **ANZAC** Day

The Holy Trinity Hall was decorated with flags and historic mementoes for a high tea on Sunday 22 April to mark the upcoming ANZAC Day and help commemorate 2018 as the centenary year for the end of the First World War – Armistice Day later this year will be particularly poignant. It was lovely to see more 40 people turn out for a sing-along of classic war songs and conversations about friends and family who had served in wartime, all while enjoying tasty treats

washed down with plenty of tea. Thank you to those who dressed up in period costumes, as well as everyone who helped make and serve the high tea.





On ANZAC Day itself, it was wonderful to see people of all ages from the community turn out at both the RSA's Dawn Parade and the Woodville Combined Churches' Civic Service. With the passage of time, and the numbers of returned servicemen alive slowly declining, it is so important to continue to remember and give thanks for all who have served in the defence of this nation, particularly those that made the ultimate sacrifice. As Christians our prayers are for the world to embrace peace and justice, while recognising our Gospel imperative to resist hatred, aggression and injustice wherever it is found.
