Light in a dark world

While I'm not a fan of the heat, I do like the long daylight hours of summer. It often feels rather grim having to pull the curtains earlier and earlier as the days draw in. There are times when the world can feel a cold, dark place spiritually too. Things – whether personal, family or wider, like a natural disaster or pandemic – can just feel too much for one person to handle, or too much for anyone to handle.

It's therefore very appropriate for us in the southern hemisphere that Pentecost comes in late autumn or early winter. We have the history of those first disciples hiding away in a room, scared and uncertain. Suddenly the flames of spiritual fire are dancing from person to person, bright light pushing back the darkness of fear. Whether being described as a flame or rushing wind, the Holy Spirit is an animating force that sets Christians and the church alight, the part of the Trinity that touches us most directly – God supporting and inspiring us to be more than the sum of our parts. Those first disciples were empowered to go out into the world, spreading the Gospel, teaching, healing, living out their faith, building a community of love and service.

The Church (and I use the capital C version here to mean the total community of the faithful, of whatever denomination) can offer light, warmth, and hope to a world that can feel dark, cold and hopeless. There is great collective power that comes as the Body of Christ, supporting each other, inspired and upheld by God to work together as Christ's hands and feet to help those in need, to change the world for the better. In the novel Cloud Atlas, someone says to one of the heroes, "What can you do, you're just a drop in the ocean", to which he replies "What is an ocean but a collection of drops". I love that idea, of each of us a bright shiny drop, united through the Spirit to be an ocean of love, hope and change.

To speak of that collective hope and work is not to ignore the difficulties we face. Things can be a struggle, the first disciples knew and experienced that as they nurtured the early church – many of them suffered and died in their service. I'm not suggesting we are called to lay down our lives, but there can be much demanded of us as followers of Christ in the 21st century. But as a community upheld by grace and the warmth of the Spirit we have great stores of strength and hope to draw on. None of us is alone, God has always been and will always be there to give us light, love, and comfort. It might be winter, but none of us need fear the darkness.


Woodville Food Bank

ANZAC Day Events

Over 40 people enjoyed a delicious high tea and music by community choir Stand Up and Sing in the Holy Trinity Hall on the afternoon of Saturday 24 April, as a prelude to ANZAC Day. A big thank you to everyone that came along, to the choir for their wonderful singing, and to all the cooks that made food!

The hall was filled again the next morning, as Holy Trinity hosted the community morning tea following the 10am ANZAC civic service. Both the civic service and the Dawn Parade were well attended, with the community coming together to remember all those who have served in the defence forces and those who made the ultimate sacrifice. It was lovely to be able to gather as a community this year, after having to observe ANZAC Day from our driveways last year as part of the COVID lockdown – though it had been poignant to see everyone standing silently in the dawn light, separated physically but together in spirit as a nation.

Earlier in the year, on 24 February, Woodville held its first civic service marking Purple Poppy Day – a worldwide day of observance to honour all the animals that have served and been killed in war. The London memorial to animals bears the inscription: "Many and various animals were employed to support British and Allied Forces in wars and campaigns over the centuries and, as a result, millions died. From the pigeon to the elephant, they all played a vital role in every region of the world in the cause of human freedom. Their contribution must never be forgotten."
