Advent Message

It's a well-worn but very true expression, "I don't know where the year has gone". It's hard to believe that it's already November and Christmas is beckoning us on the horizon – and it will be Christmas 2018! The 2000s still seem so exotic and yet here we are almost two full decades in. Children born at the millennium are now old enough to vote and strike out into the world on their own.

We are all about to embark on our Advent journey. This is a well-worn experience for most of us. The familiar readings and thoughts, the suggestions to try to focus on the season rather than the social busy-ness and activities. It feels like it has all been said before and reflected on, many times over! That's why young children can be a fantastic way to experience some of the excitement – for them, Christmas is still very new and the gaps between Christmases are still long. The uncomplicated way that children respond to the baby in the manger, the shepherds and angels, the magi and Herod, can be windows back into the powerful hope that shines forth from Christmas and the arrival of Emmanuel – God with us! It's stunning to think of a God that loves us so much that as an infinite being he accepts the limitations of dwelling fully in a human life, and living out a life of teaching, healing and sacrifice. The mystery of it should inspire a childlike wonder in us all.

Children's reactions to presents can also be instructive. The pure joy of unwrapping a new treasure is an inspiring way for us to experience and appreciate the many gifts of God – a world of beauty, family, friends, fellowship, and small things like a sunny day or tasty coffee. Children can, however, also be brutally honest if the gift isn't something exciting or right. The younger ones have not yet learnt to mask their unhappiness. This is both a good and a bad thing, and something that we can learn from too.

We must remember that our words have real power – the old saying is wrong, words can wound far more deeply and long-lasting than

sticks and stones. We need to be guided by love and compassion, which can sometimes mean holding our tongues and taking things up with God in private prayer, depending on the circumstances. But the importance of honesty, of being honest to God and ourselves about our motives, words and actions is so vital. When called upon, we should speak the truth with humility.

As Christmas draws closer may you be filled with the joy, hope and mystery of this amazing season. (But may it not come too quickly!)

Waiapu Synod

The Waiapu Synod was held on the weekend of 22/23 September in Taupo. This year's Synod was relatively low-key, with: the usual reports and budgets; the confirmation of General Synod statues relating to the services authorised for use in churches; and, presentations from:

- the Anglican Missions Board (see the separate following item)
- Anglican Care Waiapu about their ongoing changes (there are copies of their annual report at the back of Holy Trinity)

• the Koru Ministry Coordinator (the children, young people and families' mission) about her work over the past year.



Anglican Missions Board

Amazing work is being done across the Pacific, Middle East and Central Africa through the Anglican Missions Board supporting partner agencies in countries in those regions. One fascinating item that we learnt in the AMB's presentation to this year's Waiapu Synod is that the Anglican hospital in Gaza is the only Christian outreach in that territory. There are also major programmes in Uganda, Jordan and Papua New Guinea where critical help is being provided to the most needy, particularly children.

Parish giving is the backbone of the funding in Waiapu and many other dioceses (although some use different combinations of funding sources). Waiapu routinely meets its annual giving target. Over 2019 we are going to do more to highlight the AMB's work on the noticeboard at the back of Holy Trinity – for people with the internet, you may want to check out the website at www.amb.org.nz to see some of the bigger reports that we won't be able to print.
