

A Warm Advent

God is infinite, that's part of what being God is all about. Humans are very definitely finite, limited creatures. Our struggles to understand God are always destined to be incomplete, at least until we are called to our heavenly home. In the meantime, we use symbols, metaphors and complex theology and philosophies to try to explain elements of who and what God is. At Advent and Christmas we frequently talk about light coming into the world, warmth in the cold dark night.

This picture works particularly well in the northern hemisphere with Christmas arriving in the depths of winter. For us in the southern hemisphere it does feel quite so immediate a metaphor for Christmas in long, warm (well, theoretically warm) days of summer. For us, another metaphor may be more helpful. Summer can frequently be a season of drought. We can therefore talk about God pouring out his cool, lifegiving waters. Jesus as refreshment for a parched, dusty world; washing away sin, nourishing new life and growth.

To stretch the metaphor a little more, we can look on Advent as a season of preparation to catch some of the lifegiving water we are expecting to arrive. Traditional peoples in countries that regularly experience drought and monsoon dig wells, cisterns and canals to help gather the rains when they eventually arrive. So too we can make spiritual preparations to help harvest some of the lifegiving enrichment of Christmas. Prayer, reading, silent meditation – little fragments of quiet time and reflection carved out of the hustle and bustle of everyday living – can all be our spiritual wells, readying us catch some of the mystery, peace and hope that are part of God's great refreshing outpouring of live in the incarnation and birth of his son. Giving of himself to a wilted, thirsty world.

May your southern summer Advent and Christmas be safe blessed and full of lifegiving divine waters. Arohanui, Rosie

This year also saw the inaugural presentation of the Margaret Pinfold Memorial Prize for the most points in show. It was lovely to have Sarah Pinfold there to present it to winner Rona Squires. This year there was also an exhibition of beautiful paintings by Bobbi Angelini, which added another wonderful note to the Hall.

A big thank you to everyone who contributed items, entered flowers or helped out on the day. Over \$2,100 was raised for the Anglican Women's Group funds.



Waiapu Synod

The Waiapu Synod was held on 21 and 22 September in the main hall at Woodford House in Havelock North. Rosie and Brian McMillan attended for Holy Trinity. Synod opened with prayers in the school's beautiful St Francis Chapel. The Bishop then delivered his annual charge, looking at the past year, including his recent trip to Papua New Guinea, building on the relationship that Waiapu started there a number of years ago.

Over the course of the first day the Synod worked through and approved four motions:

- formal Diocesan letters of sympathy and support to the Christchurch mosques;
- putting in place a climate change strategy (in line with what was agreed at General Synod in 2018), with the clear messages the church has an important role challenging the greed, selfishness and apathy that is slowly destroying the environment, and that action is required by us all;
- Diocesan standing committee to develop guidelines for vestries to be able to consider business by phone or another method when they can't get a quorum; and

 the Diocese writing to the Prime Minister and Minister of Finance urging them to speedily implement the recommendations of the Government's Welfare Expert Advisory Group, from earlier this year, aimed at improving the social welfare system.

Over the Saturday there was also:

- a great presentation from Robert Kereopa from the Anglican Missions Board on mission work being done across the Pacific and around the world, with Synod approving the mission giving target for 2020
- a presentation from Anglican Care Waiapu highlighting the ongoing shift and work underway to identify new opportunities following the 2017 sale of the residential care facilities
- a presentation from the Bishop and a group-based discussion on the drafting of the new canon D, the part of the church's laws dealing with discipline for anyone holding a licence or position of authority; and
- a moving farewell to the Rev. Stephen Donald who has retired from ministry.

After the Synod service on Sunday morning the Synod received the usual assortment of annual reports from the different chaplains and groups across the Diocese, before reviewing the financial reports and approving the budget for next year, which is very much steady as she goes.
