# Springing into Advent

Spring is well advanced, especially since we're now past the start of daylight savings. The lambs in the paddocks are getting big, and the leaves are coming in thick on the trees. These signs of new life are a comfort as we pause to remember members of the Holy Trinity parish family that have passed away over the last few months, as described in the next items in Little Acorns.

Turning from sorrow to the abounding growth we see all around in this season, this time of brighter days brings with it the hard work and satisfaction of spring-cleaning. Opening all the windows, getting curtains washed and out on the line, wiping down every surface.

The season of Advent begins at the end of November, and is in many ways the spiritual equivalent of spring-cleaning. It is chance for us to take stock of our priorities and give them an airing in the bright light of God's love, to look at our behaviour and give it a thorough rinse in the clear water of Jesus's message of how we should live, and to give our prayer and Bible study a good wipe to knock off half-hearted dusty indifference.

I know that all stretches the metaphor a bit, but the real opportunity of Advent, of the time leading up to Christmas, is to reflect on our faith, on the words and actions that make up our lives. Hopefully what we say and do reflect in a profound way just what we believe. Advent is the chance to consider our lives, to look at just how we do live and to try and make some changes where we see ourselves falling short. We don't need to be harsh on ourselves for our failings, but we do need to try to do better wherever we can.

Advent reminds us that we worship a God who is not just out there beyond the stars, but who is here with us in everything we do, a God who is present in every part and moment of this world of blossoming spring green, summer sun, autumn chill and winter

grey. A God who loves us so deeply that he accepts limitations, is born, lives, dies, and rises again!

This spring and later for Advent, I wish you every blessing of the warming sun and loving Son!

Remembering Judy Harding

In early September we sadly marked the passing of Judy Harding. Judy was a dedicated member of Holy Trinity, giving active service as part of Sunday worship, groups such as the Young Wives, later the AAW, and in the day-to-day running of the parish, including as our longest serving Treasurer. She had to manage the parish's finances through some very tight times in the 1980s and 90s, and helped lead a number of fundraising initiatives, including the successful cattle scheme that she and Graeme put a lot of work into. Even in the tough times Judy demonstrated great faith, and knew that things would eventually work out.

Judy's faith shone through in other ways, as a calm and contented person. Her great loves were her family, her church and her farm – her love of the land and her animals shone through so clearly.

Judy was a quietly confident person, who enjoyed a good natter, catching up on all the news and proudly sharing everything her family was up to. Her smile was so warm and genuine, it lit up any room. The last few years have been tough with the health issues she faced, but it was always so lovely to see her when she did make it to church.

It was a profound privilege to have known and loved Judy as a close member of our church family. While we are comforted in the knowledge she is at peace, and reunited with Graeme, her passing leaves a big gap in our parish's fabric. But we know it leaves an even bigger gap in the lives of her loved ones. Our prayers, love and support go out to all of Judy's family.

# Waiapu Synod 2022

The Diocesan Synod was held in Mt Maunganui on 16–17 September. The Synod papers and reports are available online at <a href="https://www.waiapu.com/resources/synod-documents-and-diocesan-year-books/">https://www.waiapu.com/resources/synod-documents-and-diocesan-year-books/</a>.

Archbishop Don Tamihere and others discussed the theological concept that has been gifted to Waiapu from Te Pihopatanga o Aotearoa, Te Oranga Ake – the flourishing of the people. This was followed by Bishop Andrew delivering his annual charge, a copy of which can be found at the back of Holy Trinity.

There were reports and presentations from the Anglican Missions Board, the Diocese's Safeguarding Risk Manager, the Diocesan finance IT project, and Anglican Care Waiapu. Three Bills were considered and approved, "The Amalgamation of the Parishes of Riverslea and Hastings, Statute 2022", "The Repeal and Replacement of Canon 2 of Regions Bill 2022", and "The Chancellor and Legal Advisers Bill 2022".
